

## Holy Trinity School

The children had to attend schools outside the parish at first. In 1914, the parishoners were asked to discontinue penny Sunday collection and put in ten cents to help contribute toward Saint Peter's School. In 1922, Msgr. Walsh built Holy Trinity School. Concerned about the debt on the school Msgr. Walsh introduced the envelope system.



## Motress of the Church —

(Telegraph May 1, 1890) His Lordship Bishop Sweeten,  
Engineers Peters and Murdoch; Mr. S. Ernest Fairweather

and Mr. R.F. Quigley spent a portion of yesterday afternoon in an inspection of the site of the new Catholic Church. The position is at the corner of Rockland Road and Moore St. There will be considerable work getting the site ready for the building. The erection of the new church will be a great convenience to the Catholics in the vicinity."

## Preparation —

Preparation of the site for the Church began on May 13, 1890. The excavation and clearing of the land was all done by the men of the Parish. They came each evening after work with hand drills and dumpcarts to remove the earth and rock thus preparing the site for its foundation.

## Building —

Tenders were called on July 26, 1890. B. Mooney and Sons were given the contract

of \$30,000<sup>00</sup>. The structure was 100' x 55' with a steeple of 120' high and a seating capacity of 670.

## Interior —

Originally the walls were dark green with delicate gold trimmings. Behind the white altar was a picture of Our Lord as the Lamb with his banner of victory. Later a bell from No. 5 Fire Station in the North End was installed. The windows were all donated by parishioners, costing \$300<sup>00</sup> each, except the front window which cost \$1000<sup>00</sup>. The Stations of the Cross were erected on Nov. 20, 1892 by Rt. Rev. John Joseph Walsh. Witnesses were Michael Driscoll and Charles Ramsay.

## Parish Records

The first Mass, a Low Mass, was celebrated on Saturday, July 2, 1892. On Sunday, July 3, 1892 there was a Low Mass at 8 a.m., High Mass at 10 a.m. and Vespers with Benediction at 3<sup>rd</sup> p.m.
